I want a feeling of oppression of these working people. The tent in which the "real" scenes happen needs to have a feel of oppression and give the illusion of a low ceiling. I want the fantasy of the movie world to be very glitzy and glamorous. Bright colors with sparkle. Glaringly bright and reflecting the lights. I want all of the actors to be almost untouchable by the extras and the workers. A very distinct difference between the way the two groups are dressed. I want the movie sets to be just as glamorous. Lots of gold and shiny things. I want the set to look like the sets of the epic movies we love to see. Lush and elaborate.

In the blocking, I want the movement of the two groups to be very distinct. I want the working/poorer group to have a lower center of gravity. Everything very centered to the earth.

I want the movement patterns to be very loose and curvy. Almost nomadic as many people where during the time of the depression. I want their posture to be more slumped oppressed. At the same time, I want the movement patterns of the actors and higher ups of the movie to be very deliberate and direct. I want them to constantly have a purpose and to move with purpose to accomplish their goal. I want them to stand and move with very erect posture. I want them to move proudly with the nose in the air and their chest out as if the rest of the world owes them something.

I see the lighting working in the same way to compliment the set and the costumes. When we are in real life, I want dim and hazy lighting to help push across the idea of the gritty world of the depression. In the movie scenes, I want bright lights with vivid colors showing every detail of the elaborate costumes and sets.

I want a fun an happy production that will leave the audience walking out of the theatre in light-hearten mood. Know that everything that glitters is not gold, but have a fantastic life does not mean the everything you own must glitter.
